Provide 1-2 sentences that summarise your story and/or will capture the reader's attention. This will appear in bold as the opening paragraph of your story.

Your research story:

This is the main part of your submission. Provide up to max. 500 words on your research, describing what you do, how, and/or why this is important. You may focus on the topic or the research process. URNA readers are particularly interested in your personal reflections about research in general, and/or your particular research area, so please make sure to include reflection on research or research process. Remember this is not an academic article and a more conversational tone is appropriate and welcome.

Optional but strongly recommended:

Provide a photo either of you or something that relates to your research or article in jpeg, gif, or png.
